Overview

Support and Activities

The Caring for Ex-Offender's team has delivered a diverse range of support throughout 2023, from simply having a cup of coffee and a chat with an ex-offender, or walking the dog, to acting as an 'appropriate adult' or 'McKenzie Friend' (someone who assists a litigant in court) in police arrests/family tribunals, attending multi-agency meetings, support during minor medical procedures, help finding accommodation and employment etc...

An all-too-common problem experienced by many ex-offenders following their release from prison, particularly if they are without employment, is the absence of a constructive use of their time. GCFEO provides and encourages a range of activities; including weekly craft workshops, lunches and drop-in games sessions, a weekly walking group, coffee mornings and summer barbecues to name just some of our activities in 2023.

Service users are also supported by GCFEO in accessing various community-based activities provided by Holy Trinity Church, where the GCFEO office is based. During 2023 this included the community café, monthly community roast dinners, and for those interested in faith-based activities - a small Thursday evening church group, Sunday church services and various week-day courses and groups.

Accommodation

It is well documented that an important factor contributing to recidivism among ex-offenders is the lack of suitable accommodation. During 2023 GCFEO has supported 17 service users in sourcing, retaining and furnishing appropriate accommodation. This will sometimes involve fulfilling an advocacy role where conflicts have arisen between the landlord/Housing Association and/or other tenants and the service user. Individuals may also need help in sourcing deposits. To this end GCFEO works very closely with the Offender Deposit Assistance Scheme as well as helping individuals to access other sources of funding.

Volunteers

Our amazing team of volunteers are a major resource without whom the charity would simply struggle to run successfully. Volunteers fulfil a range of roles such as mentoring/befriending an individual service user, helping with craft workshop sessions, providing regular visits to prisoners who have little involvement from family and friends, supporting/leading group activities and offering practical assistance whenever called upon.

Funding

As with every charity, Guernsey Caring for Ex-Offenders can only continue to deliver its services through the availability of funds from external sources. The projected cost of running the service in its present form is approximately £120,000 per annum.

GCFEO has a Service Level Agreement with Employment and Social Services, this together with a substantial grant from Sarnia Housing, has made it possible for this vital service to be made available within the island. However, without all those individuals, organisations and churches who have also supported us through very generous donations during this past year, the service we offer would be considerably limited.

Caves Activities Centre

Our workshops are overseen by GCFEO Activities Manager, Michelle Stringer and GCFEO Activities Keyworker, Tracy Wilson. During 2023, we had 30 people overall who attended sessions in the year.



We had another great year at the Caves, with a variety of activities. The games sessions we introduced on Tuesday afternoons proved really popular. This is a good opportunity for people to socialise while playing board games, doing puzzles or jigsaws, or just coming for a coffee and a chat. Likewise, our Wednesday lunches have been really well received. Everyone gets involved, sometimes with preparation of food and setting the table and always with the washing up and drying afterwards.



We have provided a wide variety of Craft activities this year; including gelli printing, cardmaking, soapmaking, painting, drawing and working with air dry clay and wood scraps to make houses and village scenes. We also had a concerted effort making Christmas decorations. Quite a few people took part in our group activity of creating miniature tiles of

artwork which were grouped together, framed and now hangs on the wall in our craft room.

A group of service users also went and hung the mosaics (made the previous year) in the community garden at Wesley Methodist Church. They were delighted with them and generously gave us a donation.

This year in our Caves garden, we grew beetroot, radish, green beans, aubergines, strawberries, shallots, tomatoes and figs – some more successful than others! We would benefit from someone regularly looking after this area as the care was sporadic at times. We planted some flowers too, the concrete area was levelled and we bought chairs, table and an umbrella so that it would be a lovely place to sit in the sun. This equipment was kindly paid for by a donation received from St Peters Church.



In August we had another successful week at the OSA Pop Up shop in Smith Street and in November we had a large stall at the Round Table Christmas Charities Fayre at Beau Sejour for the first time. We also sold goods at a couple of church fayres during the year.

These opportunities to sell what we make mean that we have been able to again cover our costs for the

materials we buy and the food for the weekly lunches. We are also grateful for personal donations that we receive.

Employment:

We provided about 30 individuals with employment support throughout 2023. This work involves matching skills to available work opportunities, helping to create CVs, sending job applications, arranging interviews (sometimes accompanying clients to interviews) and continuing to support people once they have successfully secured employment. We made 162 job applications during the year and were pleased to have helped 14 clients into fulltime work during the year (although would always like this figure to be higher). We continued to provide support to another 14 clients who are in employment (some of whom started their new roles in 2023).

We are very grateful for the ongoing practical and financial support from the Job Centre Team at the department for Employment and Social Security.
